Provision of Travel Advice

NHS patients are entitled to receive advice on recommended immunisations and malaria prophylaxis free of charge. Travel advice represents appropriate health promotion for patients wishing to travel abroad.

Travel Vaccines Available on the NHS

Hepatitis A

A Single dose which confers immunity against infection for up to 12 months. It is recommended that patients have a second booster 6-12 months after the first dose. This will confer at least 20 year immunity

Typhoid

A single dose confers immunity infection for up to 3 years.

Combined Hepatitis A & Typhoid vaccine (for adult travellers requiring both).

A booster of each vaccination is required at different times – as above.

Combined tetanus, diphtheria & Polio

Where tetanus, diphtheria & polio protection is required and the previous dose of any of these was more than 10 years ago, this combined vaccine should be prescribed.

Travel Vaccines as a Private Service

Cholera
Hepatitis B
Japanese Encephalitis
Meningococcal vaccines
Rabies
Tick Borne encephalitis
Yellow Fever

The above vaccinations are given as a private service in the following circumstances:

Cholera

- Aid workers assisting in disaster relief or refugee camps
- Very adventurous backpackers travelling to remote regions with limited access to medical care

Hepatitis B

- Travellers to areas of high prevalence who intend to seek employment as healthcare workers or stay for long periods (3 months or longer)
- For travellers with a pre-existing medical condition who may be at risk of requiring medical procedures abroad

Rabies

- For specific groups of people who are at special risk due to their employment

Administration Charges

If you book an appointment with the Practice Nurse for only the administration of private travel vaccines which have not been provided by the practice, you will be required to pay a fee for this appointment

Taking Syringes and Needles on Flights

People treated with insulin or other medication requiring injection will need a letter from their GP to allow syringes and other equipment to be carried in hand luggage. Practice charge = £18.00

Taking Controlled Drugs Abroad

Information on the rules for carrying controlled drugs (including Temazepam) abroad can be found on the Revenue & Customs website at www.hmrc.gov.uk. Each drug has a permitted licence.

Other countries may have restrictions on the importation of controlled drugs. Travellers should also seek advice about the requirements of each country they intend to visit by contacting the appropriate embassy of High Commission in the UK.
